She is now 7 and old enough to take some riding lessons, go panning for garnets and sapphires with Granddad (they were highly successful) and go fly fishing with her dad. In spring, we took our RV to visit family in Oklahoma, always a nice time. From there we drove through Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee to visit friends in North Georgia.
